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# All Class Reunion 2021 Update

The All Class Reunion is a Millay Club event that has always been anticipated by and received tremendous support from our alumni and friends. Last year's reunion was canceled due to the outbreak of the Coronavirus. Although most restrictions have been lifted for restaurants and large, outdoor gatherings and events in the city, this is not the case for large, indoor events. Currently, The City of Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Board of Health's guidelines for large indoor events are as follows:

- Attendees must bring and wear masks regardless of vaccination status, except when eating or drinking.
- All guests should be screened for symptoms before the event and asked not to attend if they feel sick.
- Distancing is still recommended. Attendees should maintain 3 feet of distance between themselves and individuals outside of their group.

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

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## Sports Spotlight: Class of 2018 graduate Christian Barmore drafted by NFL

41-33, a score that every Philadelphia Eagles fan has etched in their brains: the final score of Super Bowl 52 over the most-hated New England Patriots. And yet, on Friday, April 30th Millay Club members and the Neumann Goretti community found one reason to root for the New England Patriots, as 2018 Neumann-Goretti graduate Christian Barmore was selected in the second round of the 2021 NFL draft. Barmore will become only the third graduate of our school to play in the NFL, joining Southeast Catholic graduates Bernie Gallagher, Class of 1940 and Bob Oristaglio, Class of 1949. Oristaglio was the only one to get drafted in 1951 out of the University of Pennsylvania.

Although the football team has seen many great teams and players over time, we have waited 70 years to see another graduate play on national television on Sundays. In 2017, Barmore was named First Team All Catholic and led the Saints to a Catholic League title with a record of 11-1 under head coach Albie Crosby. It was at NG that Barmore caught the eye of legendary college football coach Nick Saban from the University of Alabama. It was a monumental day when the future Hall of Fame coach walked the halls of NG to meet Christian in the NG cafeteria; students and staff could not believe their eves, and word spread like wildfire around South Philadelphia of Nick Saban's presence. Eventually, Saban sold him on attending the University of Alabama and preparing him for the professionals with an opportunity to play

on their renowned football team to hopefully help them become champions. On January 11, 2021, all Saban's promises came true: Alabama won the National Championship with a score of 52 -24 over Ohio State, and who other than Christian Barmore was voted the outstanding defensive player of the game.

In speaking to Assistant NG Football Coach and school disciplinarian Lincoln Townsend, who was Barmore's coach in 2017, Barmore has only scratched the surface in both physicality and maturity. When he arrived at NG, he struggled a bit with the structure of the school. Luckily for Christian, his mother, a Philadelphia police officer, kept him on the straight and narrow to help him reach his goals. His mom picked him up everyday from school and practice. She made sure he would not waste the talents the Lord provided. This allowed him to make the necessary adjustments in the classroom and on the football field.

When he graduated from NG, Barmore was ready to take it to the next level. Playing at the University of Alabama, under coach Nick Saban, they were able to put the finishing touches on what was started at NG. He is now ready to play on Sundays to fulfill his dreams. We believe Christian is just the start of graduates that will be in the NFL with the recent success of the football program under Coach Crosby.

The fun times at school consisted of planning freshman day, the sophomore hop, and the junior and senior proms. The halls were always abuzz with excitement during those times. One special memory for me was the small Eiffel Tower that was erected in the gymnasium for the sophomore hop and this planted the seed in my mind to one day see the real thing. After taking three years of French, this was a step in the right direction for me. The lights and the music transformed the gym.... sort of. However, for the time being, this was our "Evening in Paris."

Lunchtime in the cafeteria was a daily highlight. "All of us talked about a variety of topics; however, music was a big one." We possibly discussed our sadness surrounding the Beatles' break-up. Little did we know their performance on the roof of Apple Records in 1969 would be their last. Rock and Motown music was the soundtrack of our days.

Every Saturday night we looked forward to the dance at Bishop Neumann's High School, which was the "all boys" school then. We were out for a few hours, away from our parents and had so much fun with our friends while we danced the night away...until curfew. There was nothing better!

The years in high school are memorable. At the time, I did not realize how I would look back upon them. I just went through my day-to-day routine. However, at this age now looking back, I know how important those days really were and how they impacted my life. I was given an education that helped form a foundation for my future. What I would give for a chance to go back!

In case you are wondering, I did see the real Eiffel Tower a few years ago and the memories of the sophomore hop came flooding back.
