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Into Neumann and Beyond ... an Unbelievable Journey

"You know, Richard, you should really consider going to St. Joe's Prep," my eighth-grade teacher said to me. I remember thinking, "Why would I want to do that? All my friends are going to (the then) Bishop Neumann." The pressure was really on as both my teacher and my family wanted me to consider going to St. Joe's. In a very rare— I mean very RARE— moment of standing up to my parents and family, I insisted that I wanted to go to Bishop Neumann and that was it.

Little did I know what a life-changing decision that was for a young, newly turned fourteen-year-old.

The year was 1959. The Neumann building was way across South Philly from where I lived – on the other side of

Broad Street. Taking the Tasker/Morris Street bus every day, my friends and I began our four-year experience of what I never thought would be such a life-giving and formative experience.

Over the four years, I had some very good teachers. I learned some things which, believe it or not, I still recall today (e.g., the difference between using the prepositions "among" and "between"). But, in addition to the education which I was to learn later in college was a top-notch one, I have to say that there were two very foundational and beautiful experiences which my time at Neumann afforded me.

The first was making and finding such good friends. I never knew it at the time but years and years later (I mean like sixty

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A New Look for Saints' Athletic Department

As the 2021-2022 school year begins, the Neumann Goretti Athletic Department is gaining a new leader with recent hire Pat Devenney, who will take over what Charlie Szydlik has built and maintained over the last decade. Devenney begins his role leading a program that once was labeled as the "best sports program in the state of PA" by *Sports Illustrated*. In speaking with many of the coaches for our Neumann Goretti sports teams, they are excited to have Devenney leading the ship, as he brings enthusiastic energy and an impressive resume in his short time in this arena.

Devenney graduated from Immaculata University in 2018 where he was a member of the baseball team, playing for former NG baseball coach, Kevin Schneider. The road to South Philly goes back even further, as he started in Holmdel, New Jersey, where he graduated from St. John Vianney High School in 2014 with a state championship in baseball. After four years at Immaculata University he had the unique experience of playing for the Irish National Baseball Team, winning the country's first gold medal in the sport during the European Championships in 2018.

Devenney knew he wanted to give back to the game he loves and started his coaching career at Rowan College at Burlington County. He began teaching Physical Education/Health and Kinesiology at Neumann-Goretti during the 2020-2021 school year and quickly became a favorite among the students due to his enthusiasm and energy. The baseball team was looking for someone to coach the JV team and a few phone calls were made recommending Devenney, which turned out to be another win for the program. He was quickly indoctrinated into the South Philly culture on and off the field.

In speaking with Devenney, he talked about what made NG attractive to him personally: "What attracted me to Neumann-Goretti was the hard-working mentality that I have always heard about through the years. Being from Central Jersey, Monmouth County specifically,

you don't hear much about schools from Philadelphia, but Neumann-Goretti was one of the few that had people from my neck of the woods talking. The rich history in academics, athletics, and pride was the motive behind why the talk of Neumann-Goretti made its way closer to my hometown. The alumni that have set the stage for the students in the building today are the reason why Neumann-Goretti still has a legacy of excellence. The hard-working mentality is evident in the building. Between our wonderful main office staff, our determined administration, and our relentless teachers, we have the best team in place to bring the best of the best to our students' day in and day out."

As for his plans to keep the tradition of excellence going, while also to build on the momentum of increased student enrollment, he was already hard at work since his first day in July. Devenney said, "There are a few things I have in mind to better our programs here at Neumann-Goretti. Among those are including a few more programs that will compete in the PCL and PIAA, as well as developing an intramural program that will include the

Class of 2021 Scholarships Received Despite Difficulties Because of the Pandemic

The Neumann Goretti High School's Class of 2021, despite a tumultuous school year filled with COVID-19 restrictions and hybrid schedules, made strides in the amount of money received in scholarships for their college endeavors, while also venturing out to renowned colleges and universities to take what

they've learned at Neumann Goretti and apply it to the real world. Below are the most notable accolades and accomplishments achieved by the Class of 2021.

The total amount in scholarships offered to the graduating class was over \$28,501,913. There were over 492 scholarships offered to 87 students.

There were three full tuition scholarships

offered for 3 Ivy League Schools, including Columbia University, Dartmouth College, and University of Pennsylvania. Over 15 students were admitted into schools that are listed in the Top 50 National Universities of 2021 ranked by Princeton Review. There was also 25+ full-tuition and partial-tuition athletic scholarships offered total for

Neumann-Goretti Alumni Play in The Basketball Tournament

This past summer, ten of the best players to ever play for Neumann-Goretti Basketball proudly took on NBA talent on ESPN3 as the first ever high-school alumni group in The Basketball Tournament (TBT) hosted on ESPN.

How It Started

Under the leadership of Carl Arrigale, Neumann-Goretti's Men's Basketball team has been celebrated as one of the top high school basketball programs in the country.

During the pandemic, current Men's Basketball assistant coaches, Micah Coen and Andrew Bowman, were working on ideas to keep the program moving forward in such challenging times. One idea focused on the alumni: pulling together some of the best past players to compete in 'The Basketball Tournament' (TBT) on ESPN; a tournament that awards the winner \$1 million.

Pulling the team together was the easy part. With only 64 spots and over 150 applicants, getting in the tournament would be more difficult.

In true NG fashion, our team was successfully awarded a spot into the TBT. The NG Saints would be the #16 seed in the Wichita bracket, taking on #1 seed Eberlein Drive.

The Matchup

We would have 9 of the best NG players of all-time and coached by a 10th – all but one with professional experience. This included:

Our opponent's roster was made up of all current overseas professionals, including five with NBA experience.

NG in the Tournament

After flight delays in Dallas, we arrived in



Wichita the night before our game, where we would get a shootaround upon arrival, and another the following morning. Afterwards, we sat in the stands of the tournament's arena and soaked up this experience while they set up for the day's event.

We came back to the arena an hour and a half before game time (6pm EST). We were given our gear, including our jerseys with Neumann-Goretti on the front. While many guys wore different numbers in college, most chose to wear their NG number for the game.

With great anticipation, we took the floor ready to compete.

We led for much of the first half, by as much as 8. Our defense was great - forcing 11 turnovers, but we would go into the half down 2. We came out in the 3rd quarter reenergized, going up by as much as 5 in the quarter, but we would be down once again heading into the 4th.

With a little less than 8 minutes to go, the game got away from us. Their lead ballooned from 6 to 11 and we never got closer than 8 afterwards.

How good was the team we played? They beat Oklahoma State's alumni team by 52 in the next round.

The Experience

While the end result was a loss on the scoreboard, the experience was a win for Neumann-Goretti.

We were able to bring back many alumni who gave so much to our program.

We set a new bar for high school programs as the first one to get into the tournament's field of 64.

We were able to create exposure for the school and program. We appeared in articles in *The Philadelphia Inquirer*, *The Athletic*, *ESPN.com*, *Syracuse University*, and *City of Basketball Love*, as well as Podcast interviews on *InsidetheTBT* and *ZoomtheTBT*. The game itself can still be watched on ESPN3.

The exposure for NG wasn't limited to our NG Saints team. Kamiah Smalls ('16) was the only female player in this year's tournament, and the first to compete in 3 years. She played for the JMU alumni team.

Looking Forward

The TBT was such a great experience for our players, alumni, fans, program, and the community. We were very appreciative of the donations from the alumni and community that helped make it possible. Our hope is to compete in the tournament again next year with our eyes set on being the first high school to win.

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-two years later!), I am still very good friends with some of the boys I met while in high school. These are the men who organized all our class reunions, from our tenth all the way up to our fifty-fifth, held just three years ago. Besides our gatherings, these are such good friends who have invited me into their families' lives as a priest to perform the weddings of their children, the baptisms of their grandchildren and, unfortunately, the funerals of some of them and their family members. Still, what a gift I received, even though I was unable to realize it at the time.

The second foundational and beautiful experience was the discovery and refining of my vocation to become a priest. I never heard of the Norbertine Fathers until I went to Bishop Neumann. I had a lot of the Norbertines in class and became friends with some of them. One was Father George Feider, my German teacher who would counsel me and guide me through the discernment of vocation to become a Norbertine priest. Again, what a gift!

All throughout my seminary training, all I was hoping to be for the rest of my life was a math teacher at Neumann. I was privileged to do that for almost twenty-five years but in between, I was 'called' or 'invited' to assume various administrative positions. When my Abbot told me I was to be Principal in 1987, I remember going into the principal's office and thinking, "What am I doing here? This is Father Koob's, Father Neitzel's, Father Cox's office!" My five years as principal were probably the most challenging in my whole priestly life because of various

conditions which existed at that time at Neumann. But, again, with the help of my Norbertine brothers, the lay faculty and, of course, my Class of 1963 classmates, I think all was OK.

When I came to live at Daylesford Abbey in Paoli in 2000, I thought my involvement with the school was over. But, again, to my astonishment, I was "invited" to be a member of the board of Neumann-Goretti in 2016. Before my first year on the board was over, I was again "invited" to be the Chair of the Board which position I hold until December of this year.

Our merged school is in such a different position as the Neumann I was used to. The opportunities and the challenges are different, but the sincerity of the students, staff and parents are still the same. Neumann-Goretti is in the heartbeat of South Philadelphia. Our president, Joe McColgan, and principal, Hugh Quigley (whom I taught in Calculus, by the way!), and staff are all so dedicated and devoted to bringing Gospel values and educational excellence into every aspect of our school.

When I think back to my eighth-grade teacher asking me to consider going to St. Joe's Prep, I would think that none of the above would have happened. So, how lucky and blessed am I?

In closing, I want to say a sincere word of thanks to all our Neumann-Goretti alumnae/alumni for your dedication and support of our school. May God bless you for it. The United States Marines may have coined this phrase, but I also think it pertains to all of us South Philly "kids" who were blessed by our high school experience: *Semper fi ... always faithful*. May God bless us all for it!

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sports including Men's Football, Women's Basketball, Men's Basketball, and Women's Track and Field.

When speaking with Ms. Elyse Hennewinkel, School Counselor and Catapult Learning Specialist, she described how proud and impressed she was with the graduating class, despite the many difficulties they endured because of the pandemic:

"Most students spend junior year preparing for their senior year application process; these students were quarantining during a global pandemic. They preserved throughout the application process this year and were undeniably successful. As a collective group, all the students who were driven to go to college set goals for themselves, sought out help and guidance when needed, and let absolutely nothing get in the way of their goals to pursue a higher-level of education in the fall of 2021. They overcame more challenges than any typical group of high school graduates would have to experience."

Ms. Hennewinkel offered advice she always gives to students when they are considering their options after graduation:

"One piece of advice that I always try to stress to students as they're making a decision is whatever choice they make is not permanent. You cannot grow as an individual without taking risks. Even if you decide that the choice you made is not the best fit for you after your first year, then you learned something about yourself and you can always transfer to a school that you feel would suit you better.
