Nearly 3000 strong, give or take.

That's just about how many young women filled the halls of St. Maria Goretti High School in my time there between 1963 and 1967.

When people ask me how many were in my high school class, they are shocked at the numbers. I love that it gives me the opportunity to brag about the almost military style precision with which the school ran while keeping everyone safe.

Let me start with traffic control. Some stairs were designated up or down only. Student council members stood with ropes in the center of the hallways, separating the girls going in opposite directions -

kind of like the yellow line on a highway. Next up was feeding the masses during

Next up was feeding the masses during four packed lunch periods. The earliest was 3rd period which meant eating lunch at about 10:30. Unlike today where cafeterias sport a variety of food, ours had a very limited menu: hot dogs and white bread sandwiches as I recall. Most of us brought our lunches; however, potato chips and mustard was a staple. The mustard was in a bowl and a little watery, but that made it easier to paint the chips in the bag with soft brushes...YUM! No one I know today quite understands that one -I suppose you have to be a Goretti Girl to appreciate tasty potato chips and mustard! Cafeteria tables were long and bolted to


Rev. George Feider O. Praem. Memorial Communion Mass and Breakfast

Neumann Basketball Graduate Shows it's Never Too Late to Achieve a Goal

Rashid Bey of Saint Joseph's University Class of 2022 arrived on campus in the fall of 1994 unsure of what to expect. A native of Philadelphia, he was the first person in his family to attend college.

At Saint John Neumann High School in South Philly, Bey had had a standout basketball career, years later earning a place in the school's Varsity Hall of Fame. But in 1994, he was focused on his college career and the spot he'd landed as a guard on the St. Joe's men's basketball team.

Bey eventually found a support system in his coaches, teammates and others at the university, while calling on his own ability to adapt to change.

"I had to learn how to communicate and interact with people that I didn't know and that I was not accustomed to being around," Bey said. "It was a huge transformation in my whole development."

Bey played for the Hawks from 1994-98 under Head Coaches John Griffin and Phil Martelli. He was the first St. Joe's basketball player to earn the Big 5 MVP for back-to-back seasons in '97 and '98. In 2005, he was inducted into the St. Joe's Men's Basketball Hall of Fame and in 2011, he was inducted into the Big 5 Hall of Fame.

"He was a person that didn't say a lot, but what he did say, he meant, and he could back up everything that he said with his play," Griffin said. "He could lead by example, and I think that was really what impacted the other players on the team."

It was Bey's skill on the court that gave him the opportunity to play overseas in 1998. Less than a semester away from graduating, he said he was assured that he would be unenrolled from his current courses and could return to finish them at a later date.

Bey left St. Joe's in 1998 to play for the BK Inter Bratislava in Slovakia. He continued his career overseas for 12 years, playing in Poland, Switzerland, France, Belgium and Turkey.

"It wasn't something that I aspired to do," Bey said. "It just happened."

But when Bey returned to St. Joe's in 2006, instead of having the withdrawals on his transcript that he was promised, he was met with Fs instead.

"I was angry at the whole process," Bey said. "Instead of just getting over it and getting through it, I was stuck on that."

Bey stayed stuck for well over a decade. In the years after he returned from overseas, he received multiple coaching job offers that would have allowed him to finish his degree at a different school. But Bey said his anger at the situation and his desire to finish his degree at St. Joe's prevented him from accepting any of these positions. He tried to return to St. Joe's to finish his degree three times before finally returning in the summer of 2021.

"I had to be in the right space mentally," Bey said. "That's a lesson too for people who let anger and maybe small things prevent them from doing something great."

But Bey also was determined to finish what he had started in 1994.

"It was something that I always wanted to do, to finish my degree," Bey said. "And I definitely wanted to do it at St. Joe's."

Bey's decision to return ultimately came down to family. After his grandmother, Alma Bey, passed away suddenly, it put into perspective how fast life can pass by. Now, his mother, Leslie Atkins, is sick as well and asked him to finish his degree before she passed away, giving him a final push toward completing his studies. Soon after his conversation with his mother, Bey ran into current men's basketball Head Coach, Billy Lange, who also brought up Bey's unfinished degree. After sharing the promise that Bey made to his mother with him, Lange helped him to take the final steps toward his return to St. Joe's, with his family — his mother and his two children, ages 12 and 6 — at the forefront of his motivation.

"They're Team Rashid," Bey said. "I did not think it would be a big deal after 20something years to get my degree for everyone, but it turns out that they are so proud."

Don DiJulia of the Saint Joseph's University Class of 1967, the St. Joe's

Show, winning "Best in Show" five times. Ralph provided floral designs for events such as the 6ABC Thanksgiving Day Parade, the 4th of July Parade and the opening of the Constitution Center in Philadelphia. He provided holiday displays for private residences, galas, weddings, charitable fundraisers, and other social events.

For 40 years, Ralph was a long-standing committee member of the Republican Committee of Lower Merion and Narbeth, holding positions such as executive officer and chair of annual fundraising events. Additionally, he was the former President of the Merion Civic Association, Federation of the Lower Merion/Narberth Civics, and former Chair of the Lower Merion Environmental Advisory Council.

Ralph was involved with many other developmental organizations, including Waldron Mercy Academy, The Pennsylvania Ballet, Episcopal Academy, The Academy of Music, and the Philadelphia Boys Choir.

He leaves behind Diane, his wife of 48 years, his son, Stacey, his mother, Elizabeth Grasso, and his siblings, Bettyann and Mark.

The Millay Club is eternally grateful for all his work and dedication to The Millay Club and Neumann-Goretti High School. Ralph will be forever missed.

the floor with little swivel seats. The lunchtime ritual required that everyone had two napkins, one for the table and one for the lap. When all were finished eating, the girl at one end, known as the Cafeteria Hostess, would retrieve a wet paper towel and a dry one from the ladies room.

Starting at one end of the table to the other, each girl wiped and dried the surface in front of her place, passing the towels along to the next girl until they reached the end of the table and were then thrown away. The result was a nice clean table for the next invasion of hungry students.

I remember well attended basketball games and the cheers and ear splitting screams in support of the team.

Oftentimes numerous packed buses took us to away games; the bus tickets were only 50 cents to ride.

I could go on about life in a large school for girls but space is limited. I'm sure those of you who read this have your own recollections of life at 10th and Moore.

The numbers that filled that building will never be seen again; but, for those of us who were there in those days, it is fun to think about the thousands of fresh faced teenage girls that filled those halls, talking and laughing and making memories and plans for the future.

athletic director during the time Bey played basketball at the university, said he admired how Bey's desire to complete his degree remained unwavering throughout the process.

"He committed to his family and himself that he was going to get a college degree," DiJulia said. "It speaks to a high level of character, which we knew from day one."

In the summer of 2022, Bey officially completed his degree in criminal justice from St. Joe's, which he said has meant more to him than any of his athletic achievements.

"This thing going back for the last 20 years has been a journey," Bey said. "I'm glad that I was able to continue this journey where I started, at St. Joe's."

Griffin said Bey's determination to finish his degree matches his style of play.

"He was never afraid to take a big shot. He was never afraid to make a difference." Griffin said. "He did anything that was required to help the team succeed."

With this chapter of his life finally behind him, Bey is looking toward the future to see what he can focus on next. He said he has not thought about whether he will participate in commencement exercises in the spring. For now, he's focused on his next move.

"I'm trying to put together a youth program for at-risk youth," Bey said. "We're going to use sports as a tool to get kids involved, but it's really going to deal with mental health."
