When I first began teaching at my alma mater, Bishop Neumann High School, in September 1965, very little changed since I had graduated four years prior in June 1961. I was blessed to feel the same positive atmosphere, see many of the priests and lay teachers who taught me, and experience the same social events and extracurricular activities that I took part in as a student.

The faculty was a great mix of Norbertines (who lived at the priory next door to the school and emphatically ran the school), Franciscan priests, the Scheut fathers (officially, a missionary order from Belgium known as the Congregation of the Immaculate Heart of Mary), diocesan priests, and lay teachers. Of the Franciscans, there were two varieties: the black-robed Third Order Regular (or TOR), and the brown-robed Order of Friar Minor (or OFM). The camaraderie and banter among the faculty was great. I once asked an OFM priest what the TOR meant for the other Franciscans. And he told me the TOR meant Tramp On the Road! The principal was now Father John Cagney, a Norbertine priest who was my chemistry teacher. And of course, no student wanted to fall into the disfavor of Father John Cox.

Of course, not everything can stay the same. 1965 eventually gave way to the later 60s. By 1968, boys' hair was getting longer, and mustaches were coming into vogue. The Vietnam War was boiling,

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A Saint Chasing His Dream

There is perception and there is reality.

When the average fan hears about someone that is a professional athlete, they think of those who stay in 5-star hotels and lead luxurious lifestyles.

Then there is the reality of the traveled path of Ss. John Neumann & Maria Goretti High School graduate Jimmy Kerrigan, Class of 2012. Kerrigan knows and understands that the road to which he hopes will land him the ultimate dream of playing in the MLB is actually paved with riding eight hour in buses, stopping for fast food along the way, and living in hotels in the middle of everyday USA. That is the reality Kerrigan faces, and he will continue to face that reality until his dream is ultimately fulfilled.

The road where the journey began for Kerrigan is on the playing field at 25th and Moore Streets, where he shined as a two-time, first team All-Catholic baseball player, and led the Saints to back to back Philadelphia Catholic League Championships in 2011 and 2012. Kerrigan patrolled center field, and at the

time, and still today, is considered the hardest working kid to come through the program.

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In Memoriam Harry J. Booth, III 1940 - 2022

On Monday, September 12, 2022, the South Philadelphia community lost one of our beloved fixtures:

Harry Booth. Booth was a Bishop Neumann graduate, (Class of '58) through and through: he had the toughness, the grit, and the charisma. After graduating, he went on to

St. Joseph's University, and in a rare move, was varsity head coach of both of their baseball and basketball teams. He also was a volunteer Assistant Coach at Villanova, working under Rollie Massimino when the Wildcats won the 1985 NCAA Title. During his tenure on both teams, he helped them reach admirable statistics that left his mark on their school, just like our own community. Throughout his life, Booth remained a steadfast advocate of the Neumann Goretti community by constantly supporting our school, and we will continue to honor and remember his legacy for years to come.

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providing instructional coaching for graduate fellows in the program, managing housing facilities, negotiating with contractors, managing building projects, recruiting qualified applicants, and selecting candidates to serve as teachers in Philadelphia Catholic schools.

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was coming back from a 10-run deficit versus LaSalle in the 2011 PCL semi-finals. It's a memory that will stay with me forever."

After graduating from NG, Kerrigan went to Temple University on an athletic scholarship to play baseball, but after his sophomore season, they disbanded the program. He did not allow this hindrance to stop his momentum, and as a result, he moved onto Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU), a strong baseball program in the Atlantic 10 Conference.

Kerrigan started for the VCU baseball team both his junior and senior years, and in his senior year, he helped lead them to an A-10 championship and a berth in the NCAA super regionals. Upon graduation, he was hoping to hear his name called in the MLB draft, but the phone never rang. Instead, he decided to pursue an opportunity in Indy Ball with River City Rascals in O'Fallon, Missouri. He played 62 games there and raked in impressive numbers, which led to the best moment of Kerrigan's life: the Minnesota Twins called and purchased his contract.

From 2017 through 2021, Kerrigan started his ascension through the minor league system, starting in single A and reaching triple A, knocking on the door of an MLB callup. At each level, he consistently produced. He spent time with the big club in spring training which led to his favorite professional playing experience: hitting a homerun over the Green Monster at JetBlue Stadium, the Boston Red Sox's

spring training home, in an MLB spring training game in 2019 that was televised on the MLB network.

In 2021, Kerrigan hit 19 home runs and was considered the top Defensive Center Field in the Minor League. Unfortunately, the cruel world of professional sports put a temporary halt to his MLB dream when the Twins released him at the conclusion of the 2022 Spring Training season. Kerrigan came home to South Philadelphia, where he still works in the off season as a trainer and instructor at the South Philadelphia Sports Training facility. He tried to clear his head through his work of coaching and training others, but within a week, he got an offer for an Indy Ball team in Illinois called the Kane County Cougars. Kerrigan went there and put-up extraordinary numbers, becoming a contender for MVP of the league. He even participated in the league's HR derby during the All-Star game and called his father to come attend and be his pitcher.

Not one to rest, Kerrigan is headed to play winter ball in Puerto Rico this winter with a team called Leones De Ponce (Ponce Lions). After that, he hopes to get an offer from an MLB organization for next year and build off what he achieved this past season

The dream will not fade. The reality is that anyone who knows Jimmy Kerrigan knows that you can never bet against him fulfilling the dream.

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and some of our graduates were going off to proudly serve our country. Neumann's enrollment was bursting at the seams, and the school, with its large faculty, was able to offer a rich, varied curriculum. The very large populations in our feeder parish schools kept our enrollment healthy. The school was structured and well-run. For a period of time during the 1970s, seven languages were offered, two of which were Russian and Greek.

Following the canonization of Bishop John Neumann in 1977, the official name of the school became known as St. John Neumann High School, beginning with the school year that opened in September 1978. Indeed, the 70s were a period of growth and stability for Neumann and Catholic education in general.

Again, not everything can stay the same. And this was seen during the 1980s and 1990s in the declining enrollments of parish elementary schools as neighborhood demographics were changing. The effect, of course, was a slow but gradual drop in the student populations of many Catholic high schools. Rising tuition played a major role here.

But changes notwithstanding, Catholic education is indeed special, and for me and many of my colleagues, it was still a joy teaching at Neumann. Most of the boys were from the same neighborhoods in which I grew up, and I have always felt,

then and now, a kinship with them and their families.

As technology became an integral part of education, Neumann's leadership and faculty were more than capable of keeping up. I remember, in particular, the excellent initiatives and guidance undertaken by Father Richard Antonucci. (Richard, thank you for your service!) As Catholic high schools went to a president-principal model in the 1990s, our school was up to the task of brainstorming creative ways of blunting the effect of continuously rising tuition, thus helping as many students as possible to afford a Catholic education. In all of this, many teachers gave their all in their own unique ways. And speaking of unique ways, no one who attended Neumann from the mid-80s to the late 90s can ever forget the MOST UNIQUE teaching style of one Brother John Michael. God rest his soul.

At the end of the school year 1999-2000, the Norbertine priests and brothers, after many, many years of staffing the school, going back to Southeast Catholic days, were called to leave Neumann and reinforce their numbers at Daylesford Abbey in Paoli. Their absence was keenly and sadly felt. The Reverend Michael Olivere, a diocesan priest, was appointed President of St. John Neumann. Father Olivere did a wonderful job in his role and was a steady, competent steward in guiding and overseeing the 2004 merger of Neumann and our sister school, St. Maria Goretti High School.

Since retiring in June 2018, I have done my best to keep in touch with people still working at Neumann-Goretti. From the information I have gleaned, it appears that the school is thriving in its ability to offer students an academically-challenging, faith-based education that's rich in extracurricular activities. The leadership that was in place when I left had certainly done an admirable job.

I was asked by the Millay Club to write an article describing Neumann and Neumann -Goretti as I've seen the institution from my perspective of having taught there over the years. I hope I've provided some insights, and I am thankful for being asked to do this. I do hope and pray that Neumann-Goretti will continue to thrive for many years into the future, long after I'm outta here!
