JOHN DERENZI '87 RECEIVES THE GIFT OF LIFE

On February 22, Board Member John DeRenzi '87 received the gift of life with a kidney transplant. DeRenzi was on the transplant list waiting for a kidney for nearly two years when he saw a Facebook post about the tragic and sudden passing of Caleb Duffy, an organ donor. Duffy's cousin, Ryan Coleman '26 is a member of the Neumann Goretti baseball team. DeRenzi reached out to Joe Messina '85 about the post, and Messina connected the two families within an hour. DeRenzi had found his match, and two days later he was going into surgery to receive his kidney. Duffy saved five lives, donating both kidneys, his heart, his lungs, and his liver.



BUSINESS, LEGACY, AND SOUTH PHILLY PRIDE: CONNOLLY CENTER OPENS AT NG

On the evening of June 11, 2025, Saints John Neumann and Maria Goretti High School marked a transformative moment in its history with the grand opening and ribbon cutting of The John M. Connolly Center for Business & Entrepreneurship.

Guests arrived to an elegant atmosphere catered by IATSE with butlered hors d'oeuvres served throughout the halls during a smart, casual cocktail hour. A talented student band performed a lineup of easy classic rock favorites, setting the perfect backdrop for conversation, connection, and celebration.

The evening's program began in the school gymnasium with opening remarks by Saints Neumann Goretti President Tim Cairy '94, followed by an Opening Blessing from Rev. Father Richard Antonucci '63. Their words set a hopeful tone, quickly followed by an energizing address from Jay DeFruscio, CEO of the Office of Catholic Education, whose remarks sparked excitement about the center's possibilities.

The highlight of the evening came as John M. Connolly '70—founder and managing director of Eaglehead Capital and senior advisor to the Goldman Sachs Growth Group—took the stage to share his inspiration behind founding and funding the Connolly Center with his \$500,000 donation. In an emotional and personal speech, Connolly reflected on the values instilled in him during his time at Bishop Neumann, and the role South Philadelphia played in his life and career.

"It was an opportunity to come back to my roots here in South Philadelphia," Connolly said, "and to give back to a school that had a profound effect on my life." It was at this moment that John spoke about the importance of philanthropy in his journey. The crowd was silent throughout John's address, in which he reminded us that the center is only the beginning of what's to come for NG.

Shortly after, in South Philly fashion–SWOOP, the Philadelphia Eagles mascot, led the Avalon String Band into the halls, surging through the crowd. Guests followed the music to the front of the Connolly Center, where Connolly, joined by his wife, Kathy, and the Neumann Goretti Cheerleaders, stood beside a 30-foot-long red ribbon. With giant ceremonial scissors in hand and cameras flashing, John cut the ribbon to a round of cheers—officially opening a new era of innovation and entrepreneurial learning at NG.

The crowd then flooded into the newly opened space, where Mr. Cairy welcomed guests to tour the state-of-the-art facility. The center's main classroom, outfitted with an LED stock ticker, towering smart TVs, and executive swivel chairs, left many speechless. It was a space that wouldn't be out of place in the pages of *Fortune* magazine—designed to inspire the next generation of business leaders, thanks to VCG Construction and Emerald Business Supply.

Attendees explored the new donor wall, honoring the many who made the Connolly Center possible. Among the names were Connolly's sister Sara Canuso '69 and her husband Vito, as well as his close classmates and lifelong friends Dennis Esposito '70, Anthony Casasanto '70, and Ernie Farina '70. The wall also proudly displayed the contribution of The Millay Club, whose \$20,000 gift helped link this future-facing initiative to our school's tradition and legacy.

JOHN M. CONNOLLY, '70 2024 ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR

IGrowing up, John was a member of St. Monica's Parish and attended St. Monica's Grade School. He then attached Bishop Neumann High School, where he served as Senior Class President. Following graduation, he attached St. Norbert College located in DePere, Wisconsin, where he majored in Liberal Arts.

John and his wife, Kathy, have recently donated \$300,000 to Ss. John Neumann and Maria Goretti High School, earmarked for the creation of The John M. Connolly Center for Business and Entrepreneurship.

In making this generous gift, John stated: "This innovative center will not only serve students interested in pursuing all areas of business, finance, and marketing to help them become the leaders of tomorrow, but it will also provide an opportunity for the local business community to utilize the facility for conferences, seminars, and board meetings." He then contributed an additional \$50,000 towards the creation of the center if the funds could be matched through private donations. The matching goal was met within 28 days!

He also made a gift in honor of his sister, Sara Connolly Canuso '69, and his brother-in-law, Vito, to provide tuition assistance through the funding of a scholarship in the amount of \$50,000.

John and Kathy have now donated a total of \$400,000 to Neumann Goretti High School across all of these grants to our school.

John has a 30+ year proven track record of innovation and execution in creating successful business through his experience as CEO of five different companies and founder of two companies. He has served on more than 50 Boards of Directors, and has been Chairman and Non-Executive Chairman. John focuses on partnering with CEOs and management teams to address strategic and operational issues/opportunities associated with growth.

John founded two companies, Course Technology and Mainspring. Course Technology, founded in



1988, was the first Educational Technology Company in America and was acquired by Thomson/Reuters 30 months after its inception. John went on to become the CEO of International Thomson Media Corporation.

Mainspring, the first e-business strategy company in the U.S, founded in 1996, grew from a startup to a publicly traded company under John's leadership, and was then purchased by IBM in June of 2001. As part of the IBM acquisition, John was appointed General Manager of the IBM Strategy Group. John's vision for Mainspring was that the Internet was going to change the way companies do business and how people would communicate with one another.

John then went on to become Managing Director of Bain Capital as Head of the Operating Group. John was also CEO of Institutional Shareholders Services (ISS), The Princeton Review, and MC Communications.

Presently, John is the Founder and Managing Director of Eaglehead Capital, a Growth Fund that is dedicated to making investments in Growth Companies here in the U.S. In addition, John also serves as the Lead Operating Advisor of the Value Accelerator of the Goldman Sachs Fund, a \$5 billion Growth Fund investing in Growth-Stage Companies.

John and Kathy have lived on the North Shore of Boston, MA since January of 1985. They have two daughters, Caitlin and Lauren, who both have two children each. Both daughters and their families live within one mile of them.
